Course Title: Children, Youth & Family Development

Course credit hours: 3

Course Details

• Course description: EDU 228 will focus on the study of human development based on the theory that primary caregivers have the greatest influence on the growth and development of both children and adolescents. The course covers human development of children and youth with a strong orientation to the contexts of family, parenting styles, school programs, and the physical, and social, emotional, intellectual and moral development of K-early adolescents in various social contexts.

- 6. Develop an understanding of MTSS and Trauma-Informed practices.
- 7. Understand the impact of trauma on children and youth.

Course Requirements
